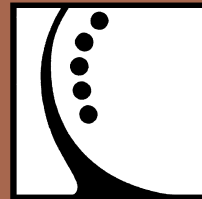


Center for Modern Psychoanalytic Studies

The Center for Modern Psychoanalytic Studies, founded in 1971, holds an absolute charter from the State of New York to offer a Certificate in Psychoanalysis and is recognized by the State of New York as a licensure-qualifying institute for those seeking licensure in psychoanalysis.

■ **Modern Psychoanalysis** rests on the theoretical framework and clinical approach of Sigmund Freud and the innovative techniques of Hyman Spotnitz and Phyllis W. Meadow. Its cornerstone is **emotional communication**, the practice of which allows for the loosening of repetitive and rigid patterns of thinking and behavior. This technique along with others has revolutionized the psychoanalytic field, expanding treatment to the full range of emotional disorders. These interventions have proven valuable to those working in the varied fields of social work, mental health, education, the law, business, and the arts among others.



Modern Group Analysis One-Year Experience

The Center for Modern Psychoanalytic Studies is offering a One-Year Experience in Modern Group Analysis.

THE PROGRAM is designed to provide a working knowledge of small-group dynamics. Students are immersed in the theory and practice of clinical and applied group analysis. Instructors work both didactically and experientially so that theory is illustrated through class process.

Classes meet Tuesdays from 5:30 to 7:00pm, and 7:10 to 8:40pm for twelve weeks. Fall 2007 Semester: September 18 to December 18. Spring 2008 Semester: January 29 to May 8. Tuition per semester is \$1000.

A MASTER CLASS in Modern Group Analysis designed for advanced students and institute graduates is also being offered in the Fall 2007 semester. Class meets Tuesdays from 4:00 to 5:30pm for twelve weeks beginning September 18 and ending December 18, 2007. The fee is \$500.

Completed courses may be applied toward requirements for certification as a CGP (Certified Group Psychotherapist, the recognized credential of the American Group Psychotherapy Association.)

Coursework

FALL SEMESTER

Beginning Group Process

Students develop an understanding of the factors involved in establishing a group and managing its development. Topics include selecting members, establishing the contract, and utilizing the spoken and unspoken experience in the process. Special attention is paid to how the group leader uses induced feelings to deal with treatment-destructive patterns of behavior.

Transference & Resistance in the Group Setting

The study of resistance patterns and the role of the group leader in understanding transference are the focus of this class. Reenactments of significant past relationships and the projective process are studied. Utilizing and resolving transference impasses are also considered.

SPRING SEMESTER

Countertransference in Group Treatment

This course explores narcissistic, subjective, objective, and anaclitic countertransference. Students develop an ability to distinguish between countertransference reactions—an essential ingredient in crafting therapeutic interventions—and countertransference resistances, which can impede therapeutic progress. Attention is paid to delineating the difference between concordant and complementary countertransference reactions.

Special Issues in Group Analysis

Students learn to recognize destructive patterns as expressions of individual and group resistances. The effects of premature and planned terminations, introduction of new group members, and other unique circumstances are considered. Students are also encouraged to bring cases or experiences of recalcitrant and difficult group resistances for discussion.

—FALL SEMESTER ONLY—

Master Class in Modern Group Analysis

For advanced students and institute graduates. This special class concentrates on the following: 1) composing a viable group; 2) preserving the group through resolution of early treatment-destructive resistances; 3) identifying and resolving the resistances of the group as a whole; 4) using the group as an on-site consultant and supervisor; and 5) developing and devising responses to individual members based on their maturational needs within the structure of the group.

Instructors



Leslie Rosenthal, PhD

is a founder and Dean Emeritus of Group Studies at CMPS. He is author of the classic, "Resolving Resistance in Group Psychotherapy," and has written numerous articles on group analysis. Dr. Rosenthal has worked as a supervisor and group therapy consultant in a variety of clinical, hospital, and educational settings, including the Jewish Board of Guardians, the Veterans Administration, and the NYC Board of Education Bureau of Child Guidance. He is a Life Fellow of the American Group Psychotherapy Association and was designated as Distinguished Psychoanalyst by the National Accreditation Association for Psychoanalysis. Dr. Rosenthal will teach the Master Class in Modern Group Analysis.

Dolores Welber, PhD

founded the Studio School in NYC with her husband Robert Welber in 1971. The school pioneered the use of a modern psychoanalytic perspective in the education of children, integrating emotion and intellect into the learning process. Dr. Welber created the first modern analytic mothers group at the Studio School and served on the Advisory Board and as Workshop Leader at the Early Childhood Center of the NY Public Library. Dr. Welber is a faculty member, training analyst, supervisor, and Director of Advisement at CMPS and the Vermont Graduate School of Psychoanalysis. She is a certified and licensed psychoanalyst in NYS and Vermont working with individuals, educators, and groups. Her papers include "Growth and Training of a Modern Group Analyst."

Elliot M. Zeisel, PhD

is a NYS licensed and certified psychoanalyst and faculty member, training analyst, and Director of Group Studies at CMPS. He is a Fellow of the American Group Psychotherapy Association where he has served as a member of the Board of the AGPA, the CGP Board that certifies group practitioners, and on the conference committee. Dr. Zeisel is Vice-Chair elect of the AGPA Foundation Board and a founder of the Center for Group Studies. He has lectured widely both nationally and abroad on various aspects of analytic group therapy.
